Anton was recently brought on by the House Republican Caucus to serve as a Redistricting Analyst. His political interests began in college as he served on student government and later staffed for former State Senator Jan Angel's 2013 special election to maintain a Republican majority in the State Senate. He later graduated from Washington State University with his degree in Political Science and History in 2016. He has staffed on many key legislative and congressional campaigns, in Washington and other states, as well as served as the WSRP Political Director from 2019 to 2021. Commissioner Paul Graves



Paul graduated from Western Washington University, earned his law degree from Duke University, and after law school he served for a year as a law clerk to Washington Supreme Court Justice James Johnson. He then worked at Perkins Coie LLP, the state's leading law firm.

Former state representative Paul Graves was born and raised in Maple Valley. He served in the Washington State House of Representatives from 2017-19, where he was the ranking member on the Judiciary Committee. He now works as an in-house lawyer for a family-owned trucking company and serves as president of Enterprise Washington, the campaign arm for the state's business community.

Paul is an engaged community member. He maintains an active pro bono legal practice, representing foster youth in legal proceedings. In 2011 he was named the pro bono attorney of the year by the Court Appointed Special Advocate organization., which represents the interest of foster children in court. He served as a board member of both an innovative college-prep non-profit for low income kids, and on one of Washington's first public charter schools, a high performing school with a computer science focus on Kent's east hill. He chaired the board of the Washington State Institute for Public Policy (a bipartisan group doing cost-benefit analysis of government programs) and currently serves on the board of Hope Link (a community action network serving homeless and low-income children, families, seniors, and disabled people in East King County).

He is a frequent writer and speaker on elections, property rights, environmental movement, and big government. Bill Whittle called Glen, "The ascended high master of political messaging." In June, 2019, Glen was awarded the "Citizen Activist of the Year" by the Olympic Conference and helps other individuals and groups get engaged in the issues. He is a frequent guest on local TV and radio shows and his articles have been published in many online blog sites.
